## Foundation announces \$16,500 in scholarships

*The foundation has given out \$76,000 in scholarships since 2002.*

Twenty more students will be getting money for college next year, courtesy of the Middletown Community Foundation.

Foundation president Tom Hecker announced the scholarships totaling \$16,500 at Tuesday night's township supervisors meeting. They all go to students living in Middletown who are seniors at various high schools throughout the area.

Receiving the \$2,000 Becky Marseglia Community Volunteer Scholarship was Jonathan Webster, who attends classes online through the Pennsylvania Cyber School. He plans to attend Bucks County Community College next year to major in business administration. The scholarship is named for the daughter of former township supervisor and Bucks County Commissioner Diane Marseglia. Becky died while attending Neshaminy High School.

Neshaminy's Joseph Seborowski Jr. got a \$2,000 scholarship named after former township police officer Chris Jones, who was killed in an accident Jan. 29 after stopping a motorist for speeding on the Route 1 Superhighway. Seborowski will attend Millersville University to major in meteorology.

Getting \$1,000 scholarships were Conwell-Egan's Brittany Weight (Millersville, biology), Conwell-Egan's Cameron Sooby (Penn State, biology), Archbishop Wood's Erin Jankauskas (Rochester Institute of Technology, physician's assistant), Notre Dame's Hunter Selman (LaSalle, business marketing), George School's Joshua McGowan (Penn State, engineering), Conwell-Egan's Julia Burke (Drexel or Penn State, nursing) and Neshaminy's Mattison Curran (Penn State, secondary education-English).

Chelsea Perugini (West Chester, undecided), Christine Esposito (Gettysburg, health sciences), Dennis Schaffer (Penn State, environmental systems engineering), Ethan Chase (Liberty, accounting), Jacqui King (Coastal Carolina, music education], Jessica Lieb (Millersville, music education), Michael Innocenti (West Chester, business-marketing) and Stacie Speece (Penn State, secondary education) of Neshaminy, Jillian Mensch (Penn State Abington, business) and Michael Dillon (Catholic University, political science) of Conwell-Egan and Regina DeStefano (Delaware, university studies) of Archbishop Wood all got \$500 scholarships.

Since starting the program in 2002, the foundation has handed out \$76,000 in college scholarships, Hecker said.
